How This will work best if your readers are a mix of ages and types. Reader 1 should

be able to pull off an upper-class sound for the first several lines that are delivered grandly. The stage whispers must remain loud while giving the

impression the readers are sharing "inside" information.

Time Approximately 3 minutes

Readers enter, take their places, and open their folders.

- **Reader 1:** (grandly, as though delivering deep scholarly information) A meditation upon the properties of fathers.
- **Reader 2:** *(conspiratorially)* Can we be honest for a second?
- **Reader 1:** (grandly) A father plays golf.
- **Reader 3:** *(loud stage whisper)* My dad wouldn't know a golf ball from a hardboiled egg.
- **Reader 1:** (grandly) A father watches the big game and screams at the TV.
- **Reader 2:** *(loud stage whisper)* My dad watches Masterpiece Theater and pledges to PBS.
- **Reader 1:** (grandly) A father is stoic and never cries—unless maybe when his team loses the super bowl.
- **Reader 3:** (loud stage whisper) My dad volunteers at the hospital and cries every time he leaves a kid's room.
- Reader 1: (grandly) A father takes naps in the hammock after he mows the grass.
- Reader 2: (loud stage whisper) My dad is allergic to the outside.
- **Reader 1:** (grandly) A father likes someone to fetch his newspaper and slippers after dinner while he relaxes in his recliner.
- **Reader 3:** *(loud stage whisper)* My dad browses Facebook on his phone while he's waiting in the car to pick my sister up from cheer.
- Reader 1: (grandly) A father likes to tinker under the hood.
- **Reader 2:** (loud stage whisper) My dad couldn't tell a spark plug from a piston.
- **Reader 1:** (grandly) A father couldn't change a diaper if his life depended on it.
- **Reader 3:** (loud stage whisper) My dad wrangled all the Pampers the day my mom went back to work.
- Reader 1: (fed up with his own statements, drops the grand persona) Enough of that. Look, we all know this to be true...
- Reader 2: Every dad is different.
- Reader 3: Some dads run the vacuum on Saturday; some trim the hedges.
- **Reader 1:** Some dads wear a necktie to work; some wear coveralls.

- **Reader 3:** Some dads are home every night to eat dinner; some cook dinner for everyone else.
- **Reader 2:** Some dads hug only on special occasions—like the return of Halley's comet; some squeeze you hard enough to break ribs every time you leave.
- **Reader 3:** Some dads are young and spry; some have passed away.
- **Reader 1:** (tenderly, with heart) Now...can we get REALLY honest?
- Reader 2: Some dads accepted us only grudgingly; some planned for us.
- Reader 1: Some dads are our best friends; some were never in our lives.
- **Reader 3:** Some dads helped make us; some came into our lives much later.
- All: My dad is different from your dad.
- **Reader 2:** But one thing we have in common...
- **Reader 1:** Those bio dads and adoptive dads and step dads and foster dads and those (quickly) dads-who-aren't-even really-our-dads-but-poured-time-and-energy-and-love-into-us-anyway...
- Reader 3: Those fragments of them are parts of our stories.
- **Reader 2:** And as you might know, we are made of our stories.
- Reader 1: That's how God—our heavenly Father—designed us.
- Reader 2: So today, all dads of every kind...
- Reader 1: From your children just as diverse...
- **Reader 3:** We celebrate you.
