Who

Timmy- played by an actor who can look under 10 yrs Janet- his mom, in her 30s

When Present

Wear A snorkel and underwater mask,(Props) Life jacket (or water wings) flippersDisposable underwater camera

Why Romans 6:1-6

How Think of this as a TV sitcom and keep the dialogue conversational. Either have a

child actor that is skilled at comedic timing, or use an actor who is older but can

pass for being much younger.

Time Approximately 3 minutes

Janet halfway out the front door and yells for Timmy, who is offstage.

Janet: Timothy Simon Markwell, this is the last time I'm going to call for you.

Your brother and sister are already in the car and your dad's already put

it in gear. We are going to be late for church!

Timmy: (offstage) I'm coming! I'm coming!

Janet: You're lucky we're going to the Lord's house or otherwise you'd be

grounded. What's taking you so long this morning?

Timmy: (offstage) I finally found it!

Janet: Found what?

Timmy: *(offstage)* Dad's snorkel!

Timmy appears. He's wearing a life jacket, over his church clothes and hobbles towards the door in flippers with a snorkel and big goggles.

Janet: What in the heavens are you doing? Church starts in 10 minutes!

Timmy: But mom, it's Baptism Sunday!

Janet: The baptisms are happening on the platform, not at a wave pool.

Timmy: I'm going to ask pastor to let me get in the tank. I want to see it

disappear.

Janet: See what disappear?

Timmy: The old man.

Janet: It's three women and two teenagers getting baptized today there's no

old man— Oh...

Timmy: Dad keeps saying, "On Baptism Sunday the old man disappears," and I

want to see him leaving. Dad says it only happens to the people who are

in the water.

He pulls a disposable water camera from his pocket.

Timmy: I'm going to try to snap a photo. I wonder if he'll look like grandpa.

Janet: Sweetheart, if we weren't so late this would be so much more adorable.

That's not what it means. You won't be able to see an actual old man.

Timmy: That's why I've got a mask.

Janet: Even with the mask. It's a figure of speech.

Timmy: What's that?

Janet: It's a way to describe something that we can't quite see.

Timmy: So, there's no old man?

Janet: It's symbolic, Timmy. The sinful life that we have before we accept Jesus

as our Savior is left behind. When those people stand up out of the water, it's a sign that they've left their old life behind and are walking

forward into God's perfect plan for their lives.

Timmy: Well, do I get to see the new man?

Janet: You'll see him smiling on each and every beautiful face when they

emerge from the water. But not if we miss the service. Let's go, we can

talk more about this in the car.

Timmy: So, is this water baptism the same thing as the baptism of the Holy

Spirit?

Janet ushers Timmy toward the door.

Janet: You know what? That's a great question to ask your dad in the car. Leave

your snorkel behind. Let's go!

They exit. Lights down.
