Time Approximately 6-7 minutes

Julie looks at herself in the mirror. She puts the final touches on her hair and then notices a pimple on her forehead.

Julie: Seriously? Come on!

Dad: (Calling upstairs) Hurry up, Julie! You're going to miss the bus.

Julie: (Talking to the mirror) You are cool. You are a winner. You will be the

most popular girl at school. Boys like you. You can do this.

Dad: Julie, hurry up.

Julie pops the zit, grabs her stuff and starts to run off when she is stopped by her Dad.

Dad: I can't believe my little girl's a senior. Let me look at you. (Starting to cry)

You've just grown up so fast.

Julie: Dad, are you seriously crying?

Dad: (Holding back tears) No. I'm just so proud of you.

Julie: Ok, well I don't want to be late.

Dad: Wait. Let me get a picture of you. Your mom will kill me if I forget.

Julie: Dad.

Dad grabs her camera.

Dad: Say "senior year"!

Julie: (Mumbling) Senior year.

Dad: Why is the screen not coming up on this thing? Do I have to press the

triangle button or the square button?

Julie: *(Annoyed)* Dad!

Dad: Oh, don't "Dad" me. I just want a picture so your mom can put it in your

scrapbook. (*Pause*) Oh, I remember when you were just a little girl, heading to your first day of kindergarten. You stepped into that school ready to conquer the world (*beat*) and then you threw up in the middle of the hall. Fruity Pebbles everywhere. Then that little girl fell in it. She had Fruity Pebbles all over her new dress...she never came back to that

school did she?

Julie: Come on, Dad.



Dad: Oh, and then there was the time that we had to get surgery on your eye

because it always looked like you were winking at people. You

Dad: And the kids called you Pirate Girl. You even won the Halloween
