Wear (Props)	Remote control Chair or couch (living room setting)
Why	Psalm 89:34
How	Keep the dialogue conversational and light. Be careful not to be too harsh to one another.
Time	Approximately 4 minutes

	n couch watching TV, obviously channel surfing. He finds something and e enters and looks disgustedly at him.
Julie:	What are you doing?
Joe:	I'm working on a cure for cancer. What does it look like I'm doing?
Julie:	I thought you said you were going to clean out the garage.
Joe:	Well, yeah, but I forgot about this great ballgame they're playing today.
Julie:	Great ballgame?
Joe:	Shhh, honey. C'mon
Julie:	Fine. Who's "they"?
Joe:	Ummm, the guys in the red jerseys against the guys in the blue jerseys. Hey, what difference does it make? This is Saturday. A guy's entitled to relax a little on his day off.
Julie: Joe:	That's not the point. The point is you promised me you'd clean out the garage. Ok, fine. I promise I'll do it as soon as the game is over.
Julie:	That's exactly what I'm getting at! I mean, why should I believe that this promise will be any different than your last promise? In fact, since you didn't follow through on the last promise, how can I be sure that this one will be any different from that one? So, if that's the case, I can't help but think that you may not follow through on the next one or even the next. Don't you see this awful thing you're doing? Joe:	You promise?
Julie:	That's not funny!
Joe:	Look, I'm sorry honey. I guess I just missed the part where not cleaning out the garage turned into a major relationship crises. I'll get to the garage, really I will. This is bigger than the garage, Joe. Promises are important to me. And they should be important to you. They are a meaningful part of basic communication between a man and a woman. Kept promises are a daily
