How Keep the dialogue conversational. The man's dialogue should build with his

excitement throughout the script. The woman should be matter-of-fact and

calm, not reacting to his disappointment at his lack of preparedness.

Time Approximately 4 minutes

Woman is seated in a living room chair, reading. **Man** enters proudly.

Man: Well? (Beat) Do I look different?

Woman: Should you?

Man: Of course! I've just made a life-changing decision!

Woman: (Sighing) Really. Another one?

Man: No, this one is different. This time I really mean it!

Woman: Ok. I'll bite. What "life-changing decision" have you made this time?

Man: (*Proudly*) I have decided to become...a mountain climber!

Woman: A mountain climber? That's quite an undertaking. And just what led you

to this monumental decision?

Man: It was a wonderful experience! I was watching television and came

across a documentary on an expedition to the top of Mt. Everest.

Leading the team was a master mountaineer. He was strong and wise and an obvious leader. I could tell that every person on the team had real meaning and direction in their lives. It had to come from the master! Just because they were with him, each person was able to accomplish great things. He was so proud of them all. That's exactly what I've been searching for in my life. So after careful consideration, I've decide to

become a mountain climber!

Woman: Well, I'm glad you enjoyed the show.

Man: Obviously you doubt the sincerity of my commitment. It was more than

just a show. You see, I leave tomorrow.

Woman: Tomorrow? Are you serious?

Man: Of course. There are many mountains out there to be climbed. I'll make

the master proud of me, too. You'll see.

Woman: Well, all right...if you really feel that strongly about it.

Man: Oh, I do! (Starting to leave) So, farewell! I'm off!

Woman: I'm just glad you're prepared.

Man: Right! (*Stops, turns*) Wait...prepared? For what?

Woman: Well, before those guys climbed that mountain, I'm sure they spent lots

of time...learning.

Man: (Stops, turns) Enough? And why wouldn't it be?

sure there's a lot you can learn from sharing ideas with them. I mean, they've been there. There's a lot to be gained from their successes and failures. And I'm sure you could learn from what the master has taught

other climbers before you

Woman: Maybe...

Man: If you don't mind – I'm off!

Man: (Stopping) What now?

Woman: Don't take me wrong dear, but have you looked in the mirror lately?

Woman: Not really. But you are carrying a little extra around the middle there. I
