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What A vibrant Independence Day BBQ becomes the setting for a surprising conversation where one man's belief in independence is gently unravelled, revealing that true freedom is found in dependence on God.

Themes: Freedom, Independence, Dependence, Allegiance, Stewardship, Identity, Gratitude, Fourth of July

Who Sarah: adult female
Liam: adult male
Narrator (optional)

When Present - Independence Day

Costumes Casual modern clothing; Sarah wears patriotic attire.

Props Small flag, BBQ tongs, drinks, printed declaration, chairs, grill (optional)

Why Galatians 5:1

How Sarah, confident and patriotic, begins bold and celebratory. Liam is measured and reflective. Humor should feel natural. Go big and have a grill on stage if possible to help the grill miming.

Time Approximately 4 minutes

Lights up. Soft patriotic instrumental music plays.

Optional opening with **Narrator** speaking directly to audience.

Narrator: Today on Independence Day we celebrate our independence. Freedom declared. Freedom defended. But what if the greatest freedom is not found in standing alone?

Music fades. **Sarah** is setting up a BBQ and proudly plants a flag. **Liam** enters carrying drinks.

Sarah: This is what it’s all about. Independence Day. Freedom. No one telling you what to do.

Liam: You’ve fully committed to the theme.

Sarah: Committed? I’m embodying the spirit.

Liam: No limits?

Sarah: None at all.

Sarah flips imaginary food with flair.

Liam: So... no reliance on anyone?

Sarah: Exactly.

Liam: You grow the food?

Sarah: No.

Liam: Build the BBQ?

Sarah: No.

Liam: Made the tongs?

Sarah: What is this, a survival documentary?

Liam: Just checking how independent you really are.

Sarah pauses.

Sarah: Alright, fair point. But you know what I mean. No one controls me.

Liam: As a Christian, I'd say the opposite.

Sarah: Opposite?

Liam: I'm free because I'm not independent.

Sarah: That makes no sense.

Liam: It didn't to me either. Independence Day celebrates freedom from being ruled.

Sarah: Exactly.

Liam: But Christianity talks about freedom from guilt, fear and always trying to prove yourself.

Sarah lowers the tongs.

Sarah: That's different.

Liam: Instead of saying, I answer to no one, a Christian says, I belong to God.

Sarah: Still sounds like less freedom.

Liam: Unless the One you belong to is the One who sets you free.

Sarah: So, dependence equals freedom?

Liam: In God's kingdom, yes. There is freedom in dependence.

Sarah sits and reflects.

Sarah: That's backwards.

Liam: Or completely right, depending on where you stand.

Sarah: So, what about all this?

Liam: It matters. It's something to be grateful for. But it's not the whole story. You can be politically free and still feel trapped.

Sarah: Yeah... that's real.

Liam: Or belong to God and be free on the inside.

Sarah: So, what do you do with that freedom?

Liam: Use it for something bigger, much bigger than yourself.

Sarah: Serving others?

Liam: Exactly. Living a life of generous service, just like Jesus did.

Sarah picks up the flag more thoughtfully.

Sarah: So, independence is a gift.

Liam: And freedom is a responsibility.

Sarah: And dependence?

Liam: *(emphatically)* Is where it begins.

Sarah: Maybe I've been focused on freedom from... and missed freedom for.

Liam: That's the Independence Paradox.

Sarah *flips the food again with a knowing head nod.*

Lights fade slowly.

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
