Wear No props are needed.

(Props) Grady is the "not-so-bright" one, so he can wear a baseball cap and more casual

clothes.

Gary is dressed a little more nice or smartly.

How Gary and Grady is written for a comedy duo (think Ocean Spray® guys

commercial or Smothers Brothers), so actors need to have a great sense of comic timing. It would also be a great idea to have some music playing in the background- just something light and bouncy to enhance the dialogue.

Time Approximately 2-4 minutes

Gary and **Grady** enter and address the audience.

Gary: Hello, I'm Gary.

Grady: And I'm Grady.

Gary: And today we wanted to talk to you about Valentine's Day.

Grady: That's right, Gary. A day where we confess our love for candy. My

favorite is the hearts with messages on them.

Gary: What?

Grady: Oh you've never had them? They are like messages in a bottle, except

they are hearts and instead of rolled up pieces of paper it's just written on the heart and instead of floating out at sea, they are just in bags at

Target...man this analogy really fell apart, didn't it?

Gary: There's a lot of things falling apart right now, Grady.

Grady: Sorry, so where was I?

Gary: I honestly don't know.

Grady: Right, so Valentine's Day is dedicated to loving candy.

Gary: Not right, but I want to see where this goes.

Grady: Which is why there are so many delicious candy options. It's a

celebration of love for candy. But there's a bigger point to it all, you guys. Something bigger and more profound than just eating delicious

candy.

Gary: Ok good. I was starting to worry that you were missing the bigger

picture which is...

Grady: And that point is letting the candy know how we feel. Which is why we

buy cards and send Valentines to the candy makers to let them know

how we feel and how in love with their candy we are.

Gary: Grady...

Grady: Some prefer to send flowers or big stuffed animals, which always

seemed a bit strange to me.

Gary: Grady...

Grady: I've even seen people purchase expensive jewelry for their favorite

candy maker, which just seems insane, but hey no judgment here...

Gary: GRADY...

Grady: What?

Gary: Buddy, Valentine's Day candy is delicious and all, but it's not the point of

Valentine's Day.

Grady: It's not?

Gary: No. Valentine's Day is about dedicating a day to making sure that the

love of your life feels special and knows how you feel about them.

Grady: By love of your life, you mean your favorite candy.

Gary: No, Grady, I do not mean favorite candy.

Grady: This is so confusing. I feel like I'm watching LOST or sitting in math class

all over again.

Gary: It's like this: I have my wife who is the person I love most in this world.

I've vowed to love her for the rest of my life. And I do. Sometimes I do a really good job at this and sometimes I do a really bad job. But I've never

stopped loving her.

Grady: Ok, so far so good. So what does this have to do with Valentine's Day?

Gary: Well, Valentine's Day exists as a reminder for this love. It's so easy to let

time go by and get caught up in the routine of life, but Valentine's Day is

there as a day reserved especially for my wife. On that day, I do

everything I can to make sure she knows how much I love her and how

important she is to me.

Grady: And you do this with candy?

Gary: Grady, as your friend, I'm asking you to give the candy thing a break.

Grady: As your friend, I'm telling you I can't.

Gary: The point is, Grady, ideally, I shouldn't need a Valentine's Day to remind

me to show my wife that I love her, right?

Grady: Right.

Gary: Ideally, I should be doing this every day. Every day should be Valentine's

Day in that sense, and that's a lot like our relationship with Christ. It shouldn't just be Sundays when we spend time with Him or worship. It

should be every day, right?

Grady: You're totally right and I have a plan now.
