Mandy sheepishly enters.

Mandy: Hello, Professor Pumpkin.

Professor: Hello, Mandy.

Pause.

Mandy is clearly uncomfortable.

**Professor:** Well, Mandy your paper was 3 days late.

Mandy: I know.

**Professor:** And I recall a post-it note attached to the paper.

**Mandy:** (Cringing) Please don't re-read that.

**Professor:** (Reading from a post-it-note) Dear Professor, please take into

Pause

Mandy: That was a little—

**Professor:** (Interrupting) Inappropriate? Arrogant?

**Mandy:** I was going to say wrong.
