**How** This sketch can be performed with two narrators (Beth & Todd) and several

other actors playing the remaining parts or it can simply be played with two actors. If the latter is chosen, transitions must be made clear to avoid confusion.

**Time** Approximately 5-7 minutes

Scene One: Two students greeting imaginary people as they come into the prom.

**Beth:** Hey Lisa, great hair. No, the curls are great, they look fabulous. No,

curls are you and don't let anyone tell you different, curls <u>are you</u>. (Speaking under her breath to **Todd**) Yeah, they're you if you're a

poodle. What was she thinking?

**Todd:** Obviously she wasn't. (Still welcoming people) Hey Toby, great

game last night. No, you were the champ, you were great. (Speaking

under his breath to **Beth**) Great for a drunk three-legged dog.

**Beth:** Was he really that bad?

**Todd:** I have seen better athletes at a retirement home.

**Beth:** You know what, it warms my heart to know that we aren't any of

these losers.

**Todd:** Especially that one that just walked through the door. Tina, Tina,

Tina, I haven't seen her around the youth group lately.

**Beth:** Oh, but get this, she signed up for summer camp.

Todd: No way!

**Beth:** Yes way! You know I just can't stand those kinds of people. You know,

Scene Two
