(**Props**) Phone

Why Isaiah 9:2-7, Luke 1:78-79, Luke 17:3-5

How Keep the conversation natural and let it flow.

Time Approximately 3-4 minutes

The setting is an office area. **Bill** is seated at a desk doing work.

Jim: (Enters singing "Jingle Bells") Hey, Bill. It's time to knock off. I thought

this afternoon would never end. Come on, let's go.

Bill: (Not looking up from work) You go on. I have a few more things to finish

up.

Jim: Bill, it's Christmas Eve. Those things can wait until later. We've got to beat

Santa to the interstate!

Bill: (Firmly) I said I'm not through yet!

Jim: Okay, okay. Don't be so edgy. I was just trying to help you get into the

Christmas spirit.

Jim walks closer and sits on the edge of Bill's desk.

Jim: I don't have to be in such a rush. All I have to do is go home and finish

packing so that I'll be ready to get up and go visit my folks in the

morning. I can't wait to eat some of my Mom's turkey and

dressing...and some of her pecan pie...mmm, I can taste it now! And then I'll sit around with Dad and listen to him tell me some of his same old stories of when he was growing up. Then I'll go outside with my brothers, and we'll throw the football and pretend that we are still as macho as we were in college. Then we'll go back inside and eat some

more! How about you? What are your plans for Christmas?

Bill: I don't have any plans. I might rent a few movies and just relax

tomorrow.

Jim: You mean you're not going home for Christmas?

Bill: The apartment is my home!

Jim: No, I mean aren't you going to spend time with your family?

Bill: No.

Jim: But what will your folks say? Won't your Dad be upset?

Bill: My Dad doesn't care what I do anymore. He hasn't spoken to me in over

eight months. Will my Dad be upset? (Slight pause) He won't even miss

me.

Jim: Bill, I'm sorry. I didn't know there was trouble between you and your

father.

Bill: There's no trouble. He just doesn't speak to me, and I don't speak to him.

We leave each other alone, and we are fine.
